




The Silver State's Natural Wealth

GOLD, SILVER, LITHIUM AND CRITICAL MINERALS
NEVADA IS THE TOP GOLD-PRODUCING STATE IN THE U.S. AND HOME TO THE ONLY OPERATING LITHIUM MINE IN NORTH AMERICA.



Nevada's mineral wealth has been legendary since the discovery of the Comstock Lode in the 1850s, which put Nevada on the global mining stage. Today, Nevada remains a powerhouse in mineral production, contributing significantly to both the state and national economy.

Gold and Silver

Nevada is the top gold-producing state in the United States and ranks among the world's largest gold producers. In 2018, Nevada produced over 5.5 million ounces of gold with reserves of approximately 143 million ounces.

Lithium and Critical Minerals

Nevada hosts the Silver Peak Mine in Esmeralda County—the only operating lithium mine in North America. The state is also a significant producer of molybdenum, diatomite, barite, and other critical minerals.

Economic Impact

The mining industry recorded approximately \$8.8 billion in total commodity value in 2022, providing high-paying jobs and supporting local communities throughout Nevada.

Major Water Sources

- The Colorado River provides approximately 90% of Southern Nevada's water supply through Lake Mead. Lake Tahoe, a world-famous 22-mile-long alpine lake, serves as a critical water source and recreational destination. The Truckee River flows 120 miles from Lake Tahoe through Reno to Pyramid Lake.
- Water Management
- The Nevada Division of Water Resources employs the best available science to guide responsible water management decisions, administering programs including water rights adjudications, dam safety, drought management, and water planning.
- Drought and Conservation
- The Colorado River Basin is experiencing the worst drought in recorded history. Nevada has
 implemented permanent conservation measures and continues to innovate in water efficiency and
 sustainable use.

Iconic Species

- Nevada is home to the Greater Sage-Grouse, Desert Bighorn Sheep, Mule Deer, Pronghorn Antelope, and the Mountain Bluebird (Nevada's state bird). These species, along with hundreds of others, contribute to Nevada's rich biodiversity.
- Sagebrush Ecosystems
- Nevada supports the second-largest area of remaining sagebrush habitat in the United States. These
 ecosystems are critical for species such as sage-grouse, mule deer, pronghorn, and countless other
 wildlife.
- Forests and Aquatic Resources
- Nevada's forests include pinyon-juniper woodlands at mid-elevations. Aquatic habitats range from high mountain lakes and streams to low-elevation rivers and reservoirs, supporting diverse fishing opportunities.

PUBLIC LANDS AND RECREATION

Over 80% of Nevada is public land, providing unparalleled access to outdoor recreation and wildlife habitat. This vast public estate includes national forests, Bureau of Land Management lands, national parks and monuments, state parks, and wildlife refuges.

State Parks

The Nevada Division of State Parks manages numerous parks throughout the state, featuring natural lakes and man-made reservoirs, including the world-famous Lake Tahoe and smaller gems like Echo Canyon Reservoir.

Recreation Opportunities

Hunting opportunities for big game and upland birds are exceptional. Fishing enthusiasts can choose from mountain streams, desert reservoirs, or world-class trophy fisheries. Boating on Lake Tahoe and Lake Mead attracts millions annually.

Off-Highway Vehicles

Nevada's open spaces provide outstanding opportunities for off-highway vehicle recreation. The OHV Program manages use to balance recreation with resource protection
